Practicing Green Citizenship at Home

TIPS FOR ENERGY SAVINGS:



Switch to compact fluorescent light bulbs. If every American homeowner replaced just one light bulb with an ENERGY STAR qualified bulb, we would save

more than \$600 million in annual energy costs. Changing five of the most-frequently used lights in your home can save up to \$100 a year.

Test for leaks. Hold a lit incense stick next to doors, windows, outlets and other openings. If the smoke stream travels horizontally, you may have an air leak.

Power settings. Set the power on your computer to have your monitor and hard drive "sleep" after a certain amount of time of non-use.

Keep your heat inside. When it snows walk outside and look at your roof. If the snow sticks and lasts more than a day, you probably have enough insulation in your attic. US Dept. of Energy suggests insulating to a rating of R-49.

Hot water heaters. Lowering the setting on your water heater thermostat can save approximately 3 to 5 percent in energy costs. By adding an insulator "jacket" to your heater, you can save even more too!

In the winter. In the winter time, improve your comfort and lower your heating consumption. Most fans have a switch which allows you to reverse the motor and operate the ceiling fan at low speed in the clockwise direction. This forces warm air near the ceiling down into the occupied space.

OTHER AT HOME TIPS:

Repair leaky water faucets. Thirty drops of water a minute can waste as much as 50 gallons of water a month. Also, don't let the water run while you brush your teeth. Turning water off to brush and on again only to rinse can save between 2.5 to 4 gallons of water.

Recycle. Be sure to recycle materials, including newspapers, office paper, plastic, aluminum cans, cardboard and batteries.

For Gladstone residents, the nearest recycling center is located at Metro North Mall.

Household filters. Keep filters clean and replace them regularly. Common houseplants may help keep indoor air clean too.

Cleaners. Use natural cleaners labeled non-toxic and biodegradable.

Rain Gardens and Barrels



Rain gardens can absorb up to 30 % more water than the same size area of your lawn. Rain gardens also help to reduce erosion and flooding in our streams.
