The Heights Linden Square

The Heights Linden Square, a property of Flaherty & Collins of Indiana, and located on NE 70 Street in downtown Gladstone MO, was completed in August 2015. The property has 224 units which consist of studio apartments, 1 and 2 bedroom apartments and 2 bedroom townhouses. Although the complex was completed in August 2015, some residents moved in as early as February 2015. Occupancy is currently at 97%.

Depending on the floor plan chosen, the apartment and townhomes offer from 489 to 1317 square feet of space and rental prices range from \$725-\$1395 per month. Residents are responsible for all utilities, including electric, water, sewer and valet trash. The apartments feature granite countertops, patio or balcony, full size washer and dryers, 9 foot ceilings, stainless steel energy efficient appliances, ceramic tile floors, woodstyle floors, 42 inch kitchen cabinets, Nest thermostats, and Roman soaking tubs as well as having private garages and resident storage available.

There is a fully equipped fitness center and heated salt water pool on the premises. Outdoor living areas, outdoor fireplace and TVs and kitchen with cooking grill are also on the premises. A furnished guest suite is available, in addition to a club room with billiards and gaming area. Pets are allowed (with a breed and weight restriction and a pet registration fee), and a keycard is necessary for access to the hallways. Leases of 6-18 months are required.

Although The Heights Linden Square is the first facility of Flaherty & Collins in the Kansas City, MO area, the company will be building a larger complex in downtown Kansas City at Berkley Park. The company is already represented with apartment complexes in other large metropolitan areas.

We moved here 15 years ago when Jody took a job as online editor at The Kansas City Star. He retired in April after a 40-year career working at newspapers in Texas, Minnesota and Missouri. We have lived here for the longest in our 37-year marriage.

Jo teaches children's faith formation at St. Therese Catholic Church and trains adults in the Catechesis of the Good Shepherd. A graduate of St. Mary-of-the-Woods College in Terre Haute, Ind., she has been a Montessori preschool teacher and has worked at newspapers, a TV station and an ad agency. She also was director of children's faith formation at St. Charles Borromeo Church for two and a half years and manager of On A Wing And A Prayer in Gladstone for nine.

A Columbia, Mo., native, Jody often visited a great-aunt who lived in Kansas City when he was a boy. 1/2 lb. ground beef

- 3/4 cup shredded carrots
- 1 teaspoon dried parsley
- 3 cups chicken broth
- 1/4 cup all purpose flour
- 1/2 cup milk

Cheeseburger Soup



3/4 cup chopped onion
1 teaspoon dried basil
4 tablespoons butter
4 cups cubed potatoes
2 cups cubed cheddar cheese
1/4 cup sour cream

In a large pot, melt 1 tablespoon butter over medium heat; cook and stir veggies and beef until beef is brown.

Stir in basil and parsley. Add broth and potatoes. Bring to a boil, then simmer until potatoes are tender, about 10-12 minutes.

Melt the remainder of butter and stir in flour. Add the milk, whisking until smooth. Gradually add milk mixture to the soup, stirring constantly. Bring to a boil and reduce heat to simmer. Stir in cheese. When cheese is melted, add sour cream.
