Item No. 9. On the Agenda. Communications from the audience.

Jim Oldebeken approached Council and stated: "My name is Jim Oldebeken and I live at 7402 North Highland. I attended several of the meetings of the Clay County Constitution Commission and there has been a lot of activity and I want to thank Councilmember Spallo for tipping me off about their meetings. I have some concerns that I think are useful at this point just as to where things are at. As you probably know, today at the Clay County Commissioners meeting this morning, that the recommendations of the Commission were approved. There was no discussion that was brought by two of the individuals. What concerns me, I'm concerned substantially regarding the process involved. The very start of this Constitution for Clay County, all of Gladstone, I guess, is in Clay County, right? I know it is a separate type of government but I think it is very important for us, of course, to know everything that is going on; especially when there are concerns. But it starts out with a quote from our namesake, Henry Clay: 'Government is a trust of the officers of the government; the officers of the government are trustees and both the trust and the trustees are created for the benefit of the people.' The preamble: 'We the people of Clay County, Missouri, enter in order to avail ourselves of the benefits and responsibilities of home rule powers creating county government to serve our present and future needs, increase citizen participation, and provide for responsive and efficient government.' In that regard, this, I consider, in my opinion, this board, this body, did not lead by example process wise with representation. This is Clay County, we have 210,000 citizens; approximately 5%-8% are African American and when this County was formed in Liberty, Missouri, it was formed by a body of Europeans and now, 200 years later, we are back in Liberty, right on the square there. and there are 14 members on this Commission and there is not one representative of a minority; including African American; the descendants of slaves that were part of our community, our County, and our State, at its inception. There was not diversity in the audience, save for one soul. Most of the time the attendance was, to me, like sometimes as a community we hit bottom and keep digging. It averaged between five and ten people as they're discussing a whole new Constitution, the serious problems we have, and yes, I think all of us want a good fix; wherever we are at, we want to get better; but this process, on top of that; failure with the public notices. If you look tonight, you will not see one on the county website, or the court website; despite those very people telling us that's where they would be. Maybe that has an impact on attendance. No minutes or contemporaneous minutes. We asked for them and saw none and still have not seen any. No final drafts; their final decision and vote; they did take a vote at the last meeting; I wasn't aware of any others; and they did a roll call but I wasn't aware of any other call to order; I don't know how you can run a meeting that way. Certainly that's the other end of the factor from this body. Very efficient. We never knew who was talking; 14 people; even after requesting them to introduce themselves, nothing. It goes on but a couple of other things before I conclude. You just get the feeling that somebody feels above the law when you are the Commission; the Constitution Commission, and you're not complying with your Public Health Director's emergency order. There were three occasions, one including over here at the Community Center, where they did not socially distance. The audience did and they were asked about it by the audience on at least two occasions. I hope you will look into that and the only other thing I have is that when it comes to representation, there was a question presented regarding representation, the concept of democracy, and the question was posed, there was

debate going on and a lot of push-back; to consider Clay County a democracy. Is it a democracy. No answer was provided and the, it was just cut off. At some point, I think that would be a great thing to pose to our City Council and, it's something good, I think, to have something to rally around when it comes to, you know, trying to get this work done citizen wise, community wise, that's where it's going to happen. Thank you."

Item No. 10. On the Agenda. Communications from the City Council.

Councilman Garnos stated: "Thank you, Mayor. I just wanted to mention the Parks and Rec Advisory Board had a good meeting last week. In addition to the usual staff reports, we usually gloss over those, but those are an important part of the Advisory Board meeting and something we spend a lot of time looking at. The Board was also updated on the outdoor pool bathhouse renovations, the Hobby Hill Disc Golf Course, the joint concession stand and restrooms for Oak Grove Park and the North Kansas City School District and COVID related cancellations and adjustments being made by the Parks and Rec Department. One of those adjustments involves extending the season for the outdoor pool by a couple of weeks and they still plan to have the very popular Dunkin' Dogs at the end of the pool season on September 19 with online registration and a limit on the number of dogs and the number of humans they are allowed to bring with them. You will also be please to know, Mayor, that this year in your honor, we are adding a special session just for cats. I'll let you know how that goes. Finally, I just wanted to add that the Advisory Board had a lively discussion on the use of e-bikes and e-scooters on the trails. It was the first time they had discussed the issue; there was good discussion. Director Merkey has been working with other Parks and Rec departments throughout the Metro to try to develop some consistency in the rules which makes good sense; so when you are on the trails as you go from Gladstone to Kansas City to Liberty or something, that there are consistent rules regarding that and I believe there is going to be recommendations coming to Council at some point in the future on that. That's an interesting new issue on the trails. That's all I have tonight. Thank you."

Item No. 11. On the Agenda. Communications from the City Manager.

City Manager Scott Wingerson stated: "Thank you, Mayor. Four things tonight. First off City Hall will be closed on September 7 for Labor Day. Spring Beautification rescheduled; very popular Spring Beautification is rescheduled for September 18, 19, and 20 at Happy Rock Park; we are excited to be able to get that in hopefully this year. Two statements I need to read for the record. The first has to do with how we provide renovations to Station #2 and how we build Public Safety Headquarters. We'd like to explore the use of a delivery method called Construction Manager at Risk and that requires a statement in public about the city's intention to consider that. So I'd like to just read that: The city intends to issue a Request for Qualifications for Construction Manager at Risk Services for delivery of the Fire Station #2 and Public Safety Headquarters Projects. Staff will bring forward a recommendation for City Council consideration after evaluation of the submitted qualifications. Thank you for allowing me to do that, that keeps us legal and allows us to move forward. When the recommendation is ready then we will decide if that is the delivery method for us as well as potential Construction Manager at Risk. Finally, we are still under a State of Emergency related to COVID-19. Clay County Public Health extended the mask requirement indefinitely, I think, is the term they used

which is highly definable so we are excited about that but I think the message is we need to continue to be vigilant. Nobody thought in March that we would be having this conversation here tonight at the end of August so remain vigilant, I encourage everybody to wash their hands, and social distance; those are the two best things and then when those things aren't possible be sure to mask up. As long as we keep doing that we will get through this. I just want to be positive that there will be an end, we just don't know when that is and we need to do our part every day. Thank you, Mayor."

The Vote: "aye", Councilmember Tina Spallo, Councilman Tom Frisby, Councilman Bill Garnos, Mayor Pro Tem R.D. Mallams, and Mayor Jean Moore. (5-0)

<u>Item No. 15. On the Agenda.</u> PUBLIC HEARING: Fixing the annual rate of levy for the 2020 Real Estate and Personal Property taxes within the corporate limits of the City of Gladstone, Missouri.

Mayor Moore opened the Public Hearing at 7:57 pm.

Finance Director Dominic Accurso approached Council and stated: "Good evening, Mayor and City Council. First of all, I want to say I envy everybody that can wear glasses and masks; I have not mastered that yet so I'll be looking on my paper here. We advertised this notice to the public in the paper a couple of weeks ago. We are required to have it seven days before the meeting. with that said, we did not have final numbers before we had to have it advertised. Several of these numbers on the year 2020 valuation were assumptions so you may notice that what I'll show you next, the numbers do not match; they are very close considering it was an educated guess, but it was a guess. This was advertised and we did disclose in the advertisement that says that these numbers are subject to change if we don't have this information from the County or the State Auditor, which we didn't have at that time. We did receive the final valuations about two days after I had this in the paper. The 2019 actual valuation; this is a pro forma, but this just shows the numbers from the pro forma which basically says we've submitted these numbers to the State Auditor and we have gotten them back approved. So, this hasn't been approved by Council; this has been approved by the State Auditor so we have to send in the calculation and have it approved before we can even levy the tax. As you can see, this gives the total valuation of the tax rates on the revenues for both 2019 and 2020. Overall, you do see a slight increase from \$398,000,000.00 to \$400,000,000.00 in valuation. The tax rates did increase a little bit so in 2019 real residential was .865 and in 2020 it will be .867 so a slight increase there. Real Commercial also increased slightly from .867 to .877 so basically what that means in revenue is 2019, these numbers are unaudited; we did actually collect, I'm sorry, we were expected to collect \$3,400,000.00 and 2020 is \$3,500,000.00. What that means in revenue, what we are looking to expect is what we actually collected in 2019 is \$3,279,000.00. These are unaudited so we still have adjustments to make to these numbers. 2020 budgeted numbers; we are expecting \$3,400,000.00. Again, this public hearing is for the tax valuation rate so real residential is going to be levied at .867; real agricultural is .929; real commercial is .877; and personal property will be .929. With that, I will answer any questions you may have." (Please see presentation documents attached for detail information.)

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING ORDINANCE 3.396, TITLE II, CHAPTER 130, SECTION 2.130.010, OF THE CODE OF ORDINANCES, CITY OF GLADSTONE, MISSOURI, TO UPDATE ITS REGULATIONS RELATING TO HORSEBACK RIDING AND BICYCLE SAFETY IN CITY PARKS AND TRAILS.

WHEREAS, the City is authorized to enact ordinances setting Park rules and regulations; and

WHEREAS, Section 2.130.010, (7) (b) states "Horseback Riding. No person shall engage in horseback riding in city parks;" and

WHEREAS, Section 2.130.010 (3) (d) states "Ride a bicycle without reasonable regard to the safety of others;" and

WHEREAS, the City Council desires to amend Ordinance 3.396, Title II, Chapter 130, Section 2.130.010, of the Code of Ordinances, to read as follows: "Horseback Riding and livestock. No person shall engage in horseback riding in city parks or trails; further, no livestock shall be allowed in city parks or trails without the prior approval by the Director of Parks and Recreation;" and

WHEREAS, the City Council desires to amend Ordinance 3.396, Title II, Chapter 130, Section 2.130.010, of the Code of Ordinances, to read as follows: "Bicycle safety. Bicyclists shall observe a 20 mph speed limit while riding on trails. When trail conditions warrant, speed shall be reduced and caution shall be observed," to provide for a streamlined process that are detrimental to the health, safety, or welfare of the residents.

<u>Section 2.</u> Section 2.130.010 shall be amended to read: Bicycle Safety. Bicyclist shall observe a 20 MPH speed limit while riding on trails. When trail conditions warrant, speed shall be reduced and caution observed.

Section 3. That this Ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage.
