Item No. 1. On the Agenda. Meeting Called to Order

Mayor Garnos opened the Regular City Council Meeting Monday, June 27, 2022, at 7:30 pm.

Item No. 2. On the Agenda. Roll Call

Mayor Garnos stated that all Councilmember were present.

Item No. 3. On the Agenda. Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag of the United States of America.

Mayor Garnos asked all to join in the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag of the United States of America and thanked VFW Post 10906 for presenting the colors: Dennis Perkins, Jim Zimmerman, Stanley Stoner, Gordon Harris, and Charlie Cram.

Item No. 4. On the Agenda. Approval of Agenda

The Agenda was approved as published.

<u>Item No. 5. On the Agenda.</u> Approval of the June 13, 2022, Closed City Council Meeting Minutes.

Councilman Mallams moved to approve the minutes of the June 13, 2022, Closed City Council meeting as presented. Councilman Frisby seconded. The Vote: "aye", Councilmember Spallo, Councilman Frisby, Councilman Mallams, Mayor Pro Tem Moore. (4-0) Mayor Garnos abstained from the vote due to being absent at the June 13, 2022, Closed City Council meeting.

<u>Item No. 6. On the Agenda</u>. Approval of the June 13, 2022, Regular City Council Meeting Minutes.

Councilman Mallams moved to approve the minutes of the June 13, 2022, Regular City Council meeting as presented. Councilman Frisby seconded.

Mayor Pro Tem Moore moved to amend the June 13, 2022, Regular City Council minutes and remove the sentence on page four (4) that stated the Public Hearing was closed, because it was continued to June 27, 2022, and not closed. Councilman Frisby seconded. The Vote: "aye", Councilmember Spallo, Councilman Frisby, Councilman Mallams, Mayor Pro Tem Moore. (4-0) Mayor Garnos abstained from the vote due to being absent at the June 13, 2022 Regular City Council meeting.

Item No. 7. On the Agenda. Proclamation.

Mayor Garnos declared July 2022 the National Parks and Recreation Month and presented the Proclamation to Director Justin Merkey.

Item No. 8. On the Agenda. Communications from the Audience.

Gabby Glossop 209 NW 73rd Street stated she was giving insight as to the harassment she and her husband were dealing with for the past two years from another Gladstone resident. She shared specific events and reported that she felt targeted by this individual. She also stated that she believes this has also caused her and her husband unnecessary issues with the Gladstone Police and Fire Department both at home and at their business. Ms. Glossop reported that she and her husband are currently trying to obtain an exparte court order to stop the harassment. She stated that she and her husband are Gladstone residents, as they grew up in Gladstone and love it. Ms. Glossop asked the council to discourage the harassing behaviors and intimidation that she and her husband are experiencing from the citizen and anyone else that is involved.

Mayor Garnos thanked Ms. Glossop for her comments and informed her that, due to the current litigation, they cannot respond but sharing her perspective and insight was appreciated.

Item No. 9. On the Agenda. Communications from the City Council.

Mayor Garnos made a motion to appoint Spencer Davis to the Parks and Recreation Advisory Board as a replacement for an existing vacancy, and the appointment would expire in December 2024. Mayor Pro Tem Moore nominated Spencer Davis to fill the position on Parks and Recreation Advisory Board that is currently vacant. Councilman Frisby seconded. The Vote: "aye", Councilmember Spallo, Councilman Frisby, Councilman Mallams, Mayor Pro Tem Moore, and Mayor Garnos. (5-0)

Mayor Garnos thanked Mayor Pro Tem Moore for filling in for him the past couple of weeks. He reported that he attended the Parks and Recreation Advisory Board meeting last week and received updates on the parks projects and on the Capital Improvement Plan. He had the privilege of welcoming people to the Blues Fest with Councilman Frisby last week.

Item No. 10. On the Agenda. Communications from the City Manager. City Manager Scott Wingerson announced that he hoped everyone will join the Independence Day Celebration at Oak Grove Park, July 4, 2022 at 7:00 pm and reported that City Hall would be closed July 4, 2022.

Item No. 11. On the Agenda. Consent Agenda

Following the Clerk's reading:

Councilman Mallams moved to approve the Consent Agenda as published. **Mayor Pro Tem Moore** seconded. The Vote: "aye", Councilmember Spallo, Councilman Frisby, Councilman Mallams, Mayor Pro Tem Moore, and Mayor Garnos. (5-0)

Councilman Mallams moved to approve RESOLUTION R-22-29 A Resolution granting a permanent easement to Evergy to operate and maintain buried electrical lines at 6569 North Prospect Avenue also known as Fire Station Number 2. Mayor Pro Tem Moore seconded. The Vote: "aye", Councilmember Spallo, Councilman Frisby, Councilman Mallams, Mayor Pro Tem Moore, and Mayor Garnos. (5-0)

Councilman Mallams moved to approve RESOLUTION R-22-30 A Resolution authorizing acceptance of a proposal from Paymentus Corporation, a business located at 13024 Ballantyne Corporate Place, Suite 400, Charlotte, North Carolina, 28277, for payment processing services and authorizing the City Manager to sign a contract for such services. **Mayor Pro Tem Moore** seconded. The Vote: "aye", Councilmember Spallo, Councilman Frisby, Councilman Mallams, Mayor Pro Tem Moore, and Mayor Garnos. (5-0)

Councilman Mallams moved to approve Fiscal Report for 11 Months Ending May 31, 2022. **Mayor Pro Tem Moore** seconded. The Vote: "aye", Councilmember Spallo, Councilman Frisby, Councilman Mallams, Mayor Pro Tem Moore, and Mayor Garnos. (5-0)

Regular Agenda

<u>Item No. 12. On the Agenda.</u> Public Hearing: Establish Chapter 205: Short Term Stay and adding Section 7.205.010-Hotel, Motel, and Extended Stay regulations to the Gladstone City Code.

Mayor Garnos opened the Public Hearing at 7:53 pm.

Director of Community Development Austin Greer approached Council and reported that on May 16th, the Planning Commission discussed and recommended approval for an ordinance adding Chapter 205. – Short Term Stay and adding section 7.205.010 – Hotel, Motel, and Extended Stay regulations to the Gladstone City Code. He proceeded to inform the council that after much discussion, the Planning Commission voted in favor to recommend these regulations to the City Council. Five (5) Planning Commissioners voted in favor of these regulations and

three (3) Planning Commissioners voted against these regulations. He reported that City Staff used the discussion over multiple meetings from the Planning Commission to improve the ordinance in preparation for City Council consideration. He stated that there were two particular points that were discussed during the May 16th Planning Commission that he wanted to share.

The first point was defining a hotel/motel by using sixty (60) or more dwelling units and in City staff's conversations with hotel developers and operators, they were advised that most, if not all, reputable hotel brands/flags will only operate a hotel if it has a minimum of sixty rooms. Also, that using sixty (60) or more dwelling units could help the City in regulating the conversion by right of some existing buildings in the City to hotels/motels that may not be of the quality the community expects.

The second point was not being able to occupy the hotel/motel longer than thirty (30) consecutive days. City Staff understood the arguments made by Planning Commissioners, but ultimately decided to keep the number of days that were initially proposed. Thirty (30) consecutive days was a widely used and accepted number throughout many cities in the metropolitan area and the country.

Director Greer stated that in the future, if a smaller boutique hotel was proposed in Gladstone and was a respectable brand/flag, and the development could not meet the sixty (60) or more dwelling unit regulations put forward by this ordinance, the City Council could make an informed decision to consider the smaller project separately. He also reported that over the past two years, city staff had received several inquiries ranging from hotels to residential housing and treatment facilities locating to the City of Gladstone for alcohol, drug addiction, mental illness, behavioral health, transitional housing, and homeless facilities. He expressed that with the recent addition of the brand new Fairfield Inn & Suites by Marriott in Downtown Gladstone, city staff was proposing safeguards to ensure that current and future hotels maintained a certain quality expected by the citizens of Gladstone. It is important that these facilities maintain their approved use, quality, and integrity as these projects age from year one to year fifteen and beyond.

There were no comments either for or against the Establish Chapter 205: Short Term Stay and adding Section 7.205.010-Hotel, Motel, and Extended Stay regulations to the Gladstone City Code.

Mayor Garnos closed the Public Hearing at 7:57 pm.

Councilmember Tina Spallo moved Bill No. 22-23 be placed on its First Reading. Mayor Pro Tem Moore seconded. The Vote: "aye", Councilmember Spallo, Councilman Frisby, Councilman Mallams, Mayor Pro Tem Moore, and Mayor Garnos. (5-0). The Clerk read the Bill.

Councilmember Tina Spallo moved to accept the First Reading of Bill No. 22-23, waive the rule, and place the Bill on its Second and Final Reading. Mayor Pro Tem Moore seconded.

The Vote: "aye", Councilmember Spallo, Councilman Frisby, Councilman Mallams, Mayor Pro Tem Moore, and Mayor Garnos. (5-0). The Clerk read the Bill.

Councilmember Tina Spallo moved to accept the Second and Final Reading of Bill No. 22-23 and enact the Bill as Ordinance 4.600. Mayor Pro Tem Moore seconded. The Vote: "aye", Councilmember Spallo, Councilman Frisby, Councilman Mallams, Mayor Pro Tem Moore, and Mayor Garnos. (5-0)

<u>Item No. 14. On the Agenda.</u> A Resolution authorizing the City Manager to execute an agreement between the City of Gladstone, Missouri, and Northland Neighborhoods, Incorporated, to provide consulting services to assist in the ongoing development and revitalization of neighborhoods for the period of July 1, 2022, through June 30, 2023.

Councilman Mallams moved to approve RESOLUTION R-22-31 A Resolution authorizing the City Manager to execute an agreement between the City of Gladstone, Missouri and Northland Neighborhoods, Incorporated, to provide consulting services to assist in the ongoing development and revitalization of neighborhoods for the period of July 1, 2022, through June 30, 2023. Councilman Frisby seconded. The Vote: "aye", Councilmember Spallo, Councilman Frisby, Councilman Mallams, Mayor Pro Tem Moore, and Mayor Garnos. (5-0)

<u>Item No. 15. On the Agenda.</u> FIRST READING BILL NO. 22-24 An Ordinance authorizing the City Manager to execute agreements between the City of Gladstone, Missouri and the Kansas City Area Transportation Authority to provide public transportation services and property management assistance for the period July 1, 2022, through June 30, 2023.

Councilman Frisby moved Bill No. 22-24 be placed on its First Reading. Councilman Mallams seconded. The Vote: "aye", Councilmember Spallo, Councilman Frisby, Councilman Mallams, Mayor Pro Tem Moore, and Mayor Garnos. (5-0). The Clerk read the Bill.

Councilman Frisby moved to accept the First Reading of Bill No. 22-24, waive the rule, and place the Bill on its Second and Final Reading. Councilman Mallams seconded. The Vote: "aye", Councilmember Spallo, Councilman Frisby, Councilman Mallams, Mayor Pro Tem Moore, and Mayor Garnos. (5-0). The Clerk read the Bill.

Councilman Frisby moved to accept the Second and Final Reading of Bill No. 22-24 and enact the Bill as Ordinance 4.601. Councilman Mallams seconded. The Vote: "aye", Councilmember Spallo, Councilman Frisby, Councilman Mallams, Mayor Pro Tem Moore, and Mayor Garnos. (5-0)

Item No. 16. On the Agenda. Special Presentation to Councilman Tom Frisby.

Mayor Garnos presented Councilman Frisby with a plaque and a key to the City for his dedication and outstanding contributions to the City of Gladstone from April 2020 to June 2022.

Mayor Garnos thanked Councilman Frisby for his significant accomplishments and valuable input on the design of the Fire Station expansion, Police Headquarters, pay package for the police, firefighters and paramedics, and hiring of the new police chief. He also thanked him for his concept that not everything has to be fixed in a well-run city like Gladstone.

Councilmember Spallo shared that it was a pleasure serving with Councilman Frisby and that she appreciated his different perspective on certain items that always made her think. She also reported that he should be recognized for his work outside of the City Council, with the Chamber and the Chairman of BluesFest. She stated that he will be truly missed by all.

Councilman Mallams thanked Councilman Frisby for his continued commitment to the Northland beginning as a police officer, business owner of the Winnwood skating rink, working with the Chamber of Commerce in Gladstone and selflessly serving as a member of the City Council. Councilman Mallams sent best wishes, health and happiness to Tom, his wife, and family.

Mayor Pro Tem Moore stated that prior to being on the Council, she remembered seeing Councilman Frisby's capable leadership as the Chairman of the Chamber, his service with BluesFest that made it a success and that he was a successful business owner for many years in the community. Mayor Pro Tem Moore shared that she has always respected and admired his point of view, even when they did not always agree. She expressed that she had been impressed with his thoughtful and careful way that he arrived at solutions and decisions and that he always had the best interest of the city throughout all of the council's deliberations. She stated that he would be missed as part of the Gladstone family and wished he, his wife, and daughter the very best in their journey.

Councilman Frisby apologized to the residents of Gladstone, the leadership team, and the council members for not completing his term that he had all intentions of doing. He also apologized for the burden it has placed on the council for the vacant seat. Councilman Frisby thanked his wife Laura and shared that the process of being a councilmember was a first time experience and that his wife helped navigate the process. He thanked former City Councilmember and form Mayor Carol Rudy, who encouraged him to run for City Council and had been his mentor through the process. He also thanked City Manager Scott Wingerson for his guidance and for the conversations with City Manager Wingerson and Assistant City Manager Bob Baer. He continued to thank the City Leadership team and former City Clerk, Ruth Bucchino, He expressed his thanks to the City Council Members and stated that had been a pleasure working with them. He thanked Mayor Pro Tem Jean Moore for being a great mentor to him. Councilman Frisby shared that he was pleased to see the progress at the City thus far and he was glad that he was able to play a small part in it. He suggested that everyone keep chasing excellence and recommended that anyone interested in being a member of the City Council, should pursue it.

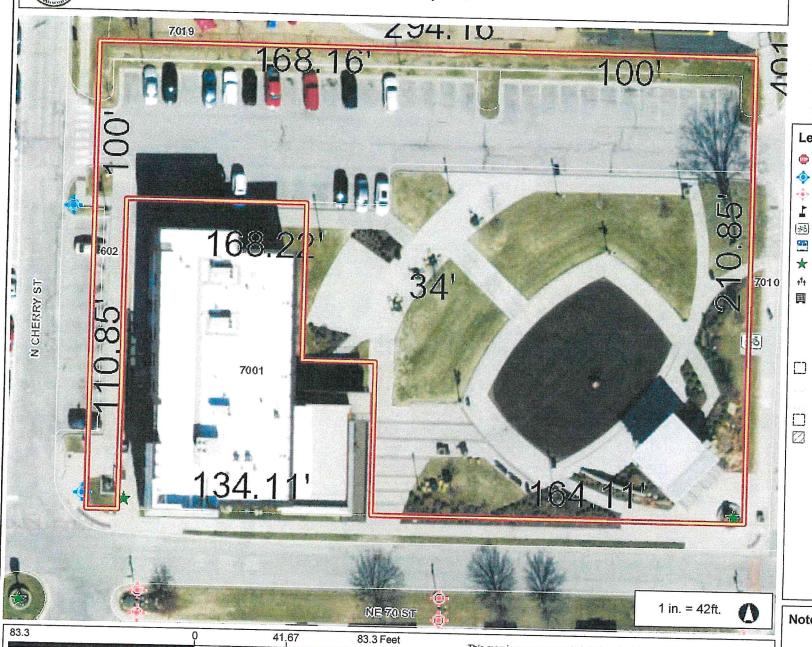

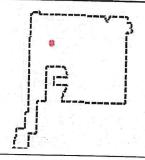

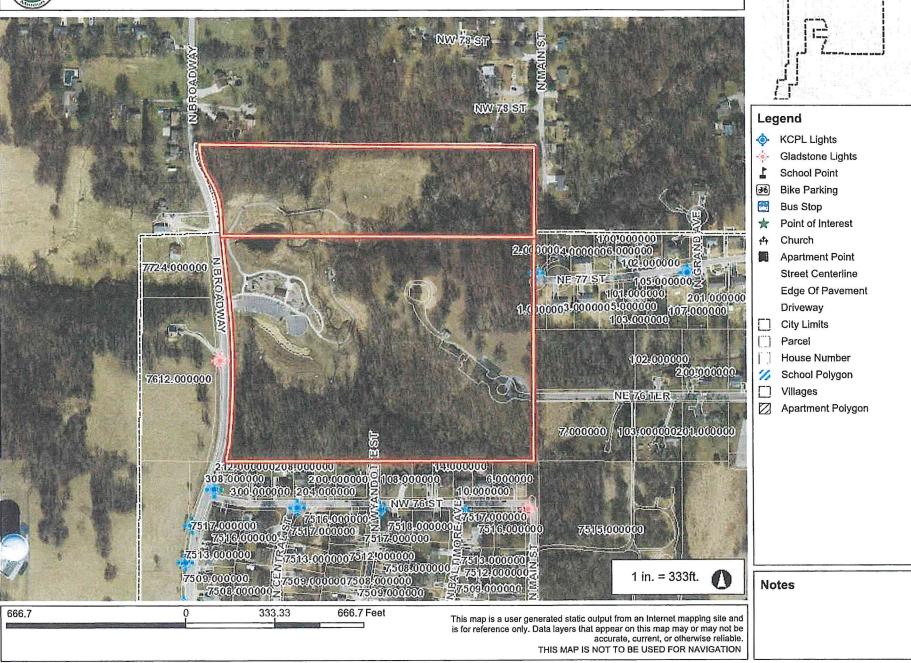

Revised 2022 Street Maintenance Program

City staff presented the preliminary street maintenance program earlier this year. Staff noted at that time that construction prices continue to remain volatile due to the COVID-19 pandemic and other world events. Since that time, the price of oil and other raw materials has continued to escalate.

To date, the City has opened bids for both the first phase of the concrete replacement program and the annual mill and overlay program and construction prices have increased in excess of 30% for both projects. As a result, it will be necessary to push the mill and overlay of some streets back one year. Staff is proposing to complete all concrete work on streets presented in the original plan and push the mill and overlay of several streets into 2023. A revised list is attached to this memorandum. Furthermore, approximately \$500,000 is still set aside to complete intermediate maintenance, additional sidewalk repairs, and change orders.

Community Grant Program

The State of Missouri appropriated \$410 million dollars of its American Rescue Plan Act of 2021 (ARPA) funds to invest in water and sewer infrastructure through the community grant program administered by MODNR. The grant categories and the available funding amounts are Drinking Water Infrastructure (\$125 million), Wastewater Infrastructure (\$125 million), Stormwater Infrastructure (\$150 million), and Lead Service Line Inventories (\$10 million). Communities can apply for one project in each category. The maximum grant award for drinking water, wastewater, and stormwater projects is \$5 million and the maximum grant award for lead service line inventories is \$200,000.

For each project category, MODNR has established scoring criteria that takes into account financial need, system reliability, and project status. A project with a local match that exceeds 20% of the project cost will receive additional points. The deadline for project applications is July 14, 2022 and all funds must be obligated by December 31, 2024 and spent by December 31, 2026.

MODNR requires a resolution on its standard form granting the City Manager the authority to submit an application on behalf of the City. The application also requires the City to certify that funds are available for the local match. Future financing cannot be used for the local match, therefore, staff is proposing projects that are either currently funded or can be paid from fund balance.

Staff recommends that the City submit a project application for the following projects:

Water Treatment Plant Improvements

Lamp-Rynearson has completed the Water Treatment Plant Master Plan and has submitted the report to MODNR. The proposed application will include sand filter rehabilitation, lime feed system rehabilitation, primary and secondary basin rehabilitation, a change from gas chlorine to sodium hypochlorite for disinfection, 5-MG reservoir improvements, SCADA upgrades, and electrical improvements. The City is seeking \$3,950,000 in grant funds to combine with

\$1,050,000 in local funds. The local match is available in CWSS fund balance and a reduction in debt service in FY24.

NE 68th Street and N. Bellefontaine Storm Improvements

The proposed project will include bank stabilization and the installation of new curb inlets and pipe at NE 67th Terrace and NE 68th Terrace. The City is seeking \$395,000 in grant funds to combine with \$105,000 in local funds. The local match is programmed in the CIST fund in FY23.

East Creek Sanitary Sewer Improvements

The sanitary sewer in the vicinity of N. Broadway and NE 61st Street surcharges during heavy rains. The proposed project will increase the capacity of the existing sewer in this area and rehabilitate existing sewers in the East Creek watershed as funding allows. The City is seeking \$474,000 in grant funds to combine with \$126,000 in local funds. A total of \$50,000 is budgeted in the CWSS fund for sanitary sewer improvements in FY23 and the remaining \$76,000 is available in fund balance.

Lead Service Line Inventory

Water systems are required to inventory service line materials by October 2024 with an eventual goal of removing all lead service lines from service. The number of lead service lines in Gladstone is expected to be small, however, the City is still required to complete the inventory. The City is seeking \$158,000 in grant funds to combine with \$42,000 in local funds. The local match is available in CWSS fund balance.

<u>Background</u>: The Water Treatment Plant East Secondary Basin is currently not in service. The basin scrapers will not rotate and City staff has been working with Lamp-Rynearson to identify the cause of the failure. It appears that a portion of the basin has dropped approximately 2" causing the scrapers to drag on the basin floor. In order to correct the issue, the bridge and basin middle section will need to be raised to their original position using a large crane and the existing structural steel members need to be reinforced. Due to the specialty nature of the work, staff has requested the assistance of David E. Ross Construction Company. A report from Lamp-Rynearson is attached which includes a sketch of the East Secondary Basin.

The East Secondary Basin is a critical part of the treatment process and needs to be placed back in service in a timely fashion. City staff has executed a time and materials contract with David E. We recently inspected the reference clarifier in response to a failure of the mechanism involving jamming of the muffler ring at the center column. During our inspection, we performed a scan of the clarifier equipment. We have also been in contact with representatives from Ross Construction who also visited the site and made an inspection.

The secondary clarifiers were installed in 1974 and have been in service for nearly fifty years. The clarifier has a diameter of sixty feet. The equipment is supported by a full length bridge consisting of two MC18 x 42.7 channels. All of the clarifier equipment is supported by the bridge. The cone and muffler ring are stationary, and the center column and scrapers rotate within the cone.

Enclosed with this letter is a view of the scan that shows the deflection of the bridge beams, which is approximately 1.5" to 2" at the center of the beams. The measurements from the scan are similar to measurements made by Ross Construction. Our inspection also showed that three of the scrapers have settled to the floor, the cone has deflected at tie-rod locations, and the upper portion of the cone (approximately 12") has badly deteriorated. The scrapers have previously been trimmed in the past to provide clearance at the floor. There are also sump stirrers attached to the bottom of the column that extend into the hopper in the floor. Full access to the hopper is not possible, but it does not appear that the sump stirrers are touching the sides or bottom of the hopper.

The loads supported by the beams will normally cause the beams to deflect. The measured deflection is roughly equivalent to L/480 to L/360, which would be acceptable for a bridge meant only to provide access. The deflection is excessive for a bridge that supports equipment. Based on catalog information, the center column loading amounts to 44,200 pounds of equipment. The bridge beams by themselves are not capable of supporting such a load. We reached out to Trent Ropp of Ray Lindsey, who handle the WesTech line. WesTech produces what was the U.S. Filter clarifier line. WesTech could not provide design information specific to Gladstone's clarifiers, but was able to tell us that the steel used was likely 36 ksi and that the bridge used a truss design. The attached sketch provides some detail that shows the truss support system. Truss supported equipment dead loads (does not account for live loads) provide a calculated bridge trussed-beam deflection of about 0.62". Full bridge live loads per code could add up to an additional 2.2" of deflection.

It is our opinion that the bridge beams have further deflected over time due to material loss caused by corrosion. There is some minor material loss of the bridge beams at the connections with the cone, but there appears to be significant loss of the truss rods above the water level (see attached photo of the rod just under the bridge beam). As material loss occurred, deflection increased, the scrapers came into contact with the floor, the muffler ring bound at the center column and the drive chain broke. When the muffler ring became bound, the torque on the cone tie rod connections caused the connecting piping and the cone to deflect.

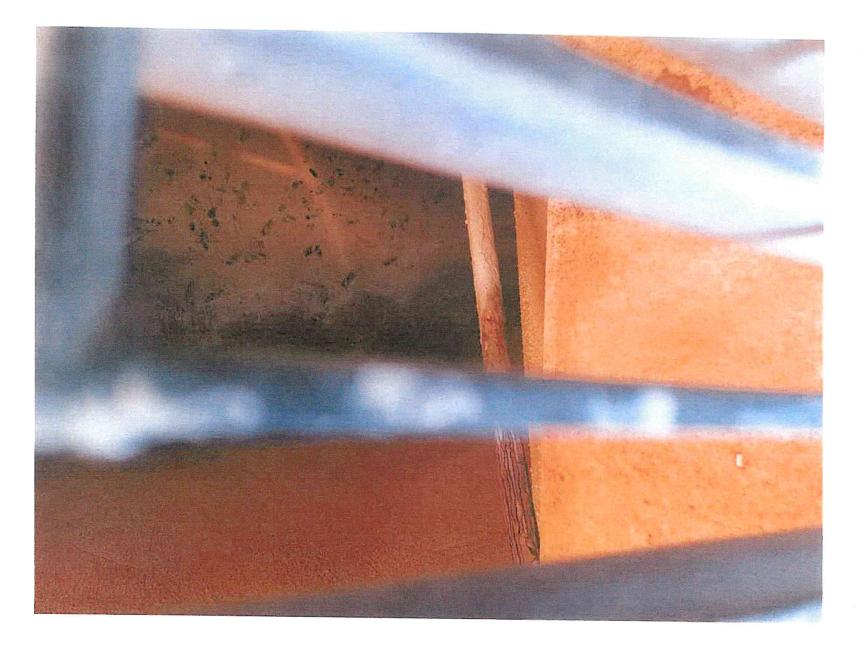
Our recommendation will be to replace the corroded ends of the four truss rods (about a 6' section) while raising the bridge. We are continuing to coordinate with staff and Ross construction to determine the best means to support the bridge during repairs, along with possible additional means of support.

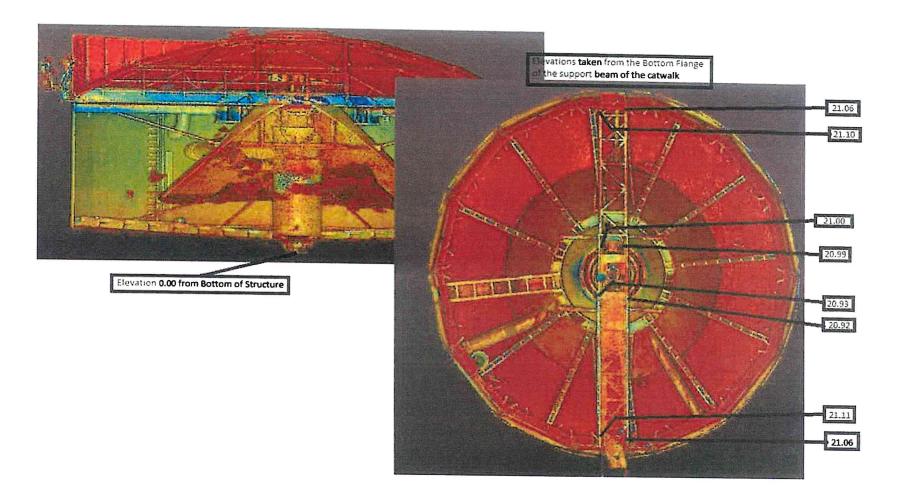
