Mayor Mallams said he is very happy to see Resolution R-22-01, on the agenda tonight. Along with the renovation of the outdoor pool bathhouse, two new shade structures will be installed for pool patrons. He said he appreciates this for both the parents of newborns, and for old-borns like himself.

River To Rise Again

Forecast Sets Off Waves Of Action

Going, going ... and still

Up, that is,

Forecasters said Saturday that the Mississippi River would start rising again this week and set a record when it crests here next Sunday at 48 feet, a foot above last week's peak. And some pessimists believe the river could go even higher.

The stunning news caused floodworn residents from St. Charles to Ste. Genevieve. Mo, to gird themselves - and their levees --- for another wet onslaught.

"This is like water torture, a constant dripping on my forehead," said Bob Anderson, a spokesman for the Army Corps of Engineers.

If the flood were a hurricane. this weekend might have been its eye; the river stayed at 46.5 feet at St. Louis Saturday, But more rain in the Upper Mid-

Two Others **Died Holding** Each Other



Gary Mahr heard the roar of the water and clung to a ledge in an air pocket as a flash flood swept through a dark cave.

Four other boys and two counselors from St. Joseph's Home for Boys drowned in the outing to Cliff Cave in south St. Louis County.

Gary, 13, was rescued at 10:30 a.m. Saturday. He had spent more than 20 hours hunched on a ledge in a 4foot-high, 2,000foot-long passageway called the "Drapery Room Crawl,



bodies were found Friday and two others on Saturday.

The deaths prompted an investigation to determine whether anyone should be prosecuted for taking children into a park closed for two weeks. because of flooding, said County Police Chief Ron Battelle.

Gary was in generally good physical shape at Cardinal Gennon Chirdren's Hospital, where he was being treated for hypothermia and a bump

Cave Flood Drowns 4; 3 Missing

Outing Turns Into A Disaster For Children

A caving expedition for 16 children from a St. Louis boys' home ended disastrously Friday when a flash flood swept through a cave in south St. Louis County, killing three children and a male counselor.

Two other boys and a 21-year-old female counselor still were missing at 10 p.m. Friday, when the search was called off for the night. It was set to resume at 9 a.m. today.

The children were from St. Joseph's Home for Boys, at 4753 South Grand Boulevard, a residential treatment center for abused or troubled youths.

Police withheld the names of the victims pending notification of relatives. Two of the dead boys were 10 and 12: the missing boys are 9 and 10.

The boys were exploring Cliff Cave, the centerpiece attraction in Cliff Cave Park, a county facility that has been closed for at least two weeks because of fleading from the

THE MOSBY SANDSTONE CAVE, CLAY COUNTY, MISSOURI

(Abstract)

The Mosby Sandstone Cave occurs in the Stranger Sandstone just north of Kansas City. The total length of the cave is approximately 250 feet, with an average width and height of two feet; but the entrance is much larger. The Stanton limestones and shales are exposed in sequence on the floor of the cave.

A chemical analysis of the sandstone shows only a trace of calcium carbonate; therefore solution of the sandstone is not important.

Solution of the underlying limestones has exposed the standstone as the roof of the cave. The sandstone rapidly yielded to mechanical weathering, thus enlarging the cavity. This hypothesis is proven by the gradual change of the walls from sandstone to limestone back in the cave. Still farther back in the cave the roof changes from sandstone to limestone.
